• Winter Weather Update (NWS - Meteorologist, Doug Cramer):

Jason Lionberger, Cal OHSEP discussed the Train Derailment TTX on October 31st. Liz Harmon, ADRC urged attendees to remind their ERs to review "DUMBELS" with the staff, and if a suspected organophosphate exposure occurs the course of action begins with contacting Louisiana Poison Control by telephoning 800-222-1222.




How will CHEMPACK be used?

- ➤ It is expected that a nerve agent incident will be identified locally. CHEMPACK will be used by first responders in the field and by health care professionals in hospitals. The Louisiana Poison Center will provide consultation on symptoms of nerve agent or organophosphate poisoning with first responders and health care professionals.


 The Louisiana Poison Center can be contacted 24/7 by telephoning 800-222-1222.
- Allocation of assets will be coordinated by the Louisiana Poison Center in the first hours of an incident. Pre-event planning has begun with local and state response partners. These include the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, parish Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, Louisiana State Police, Louisiana Sheriff's Association, local law enforcement, the Louisiana Department of Health Office of Public Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Service, EMS providers, Louisiana Hospital Association, hospitals, and the Louisiana Poison Center. CHEMPACK will be an addition to existing state, regional, local, and facility plan

<u>WEATHER UPDATE (NWS):</u> Doug Cramer, Warning Coordination Meteorologist – <u>KPLC 7 Weather First Alert Forecast, Tuesday, December 12, 2023: Joseph Ink</u>

- LAKE CHARLES, La. (KPLC) Extra clouds are keeping the afternoons cool, but also the nights slightly warmer as we continue through the week.
- Enough breaks in the thin cloud cover overnight have allowed temperatures to drop back into a chilly range for many north of I-10 this morning. Winds have been slow to pick up and we managed to get frost on the ground again in some areas, however the breeze will be rising a little today and we could see gusts as high as 20 mph at times out of the east to northeast. Cloud cover will continue building today especially in the afternoon, which is likely to hold our temperatures cooler. Highs should top out similar to yesterday around the low to mid 60's. With some extra shade and a bit of a breeze, it will feel a little extra cool spending time outdoors. Although cloud cover is getting thicker, rain chances are still minimal.







US National Weather Service (NWS) Lake Charles:

• Dry weather will continue through Thursday; however, thunderstorms will return Friday. An area of low pressure will move Across the gulf with rain and thunderstorms expected to remain in the region through Saturday night



KPLC 7 Weather First Alert Forecast, Tuesday, December 12, 2023: Joseph Ink

- LAKE CHARLES, La. (KPLC) Clouds are working back into our area soon, but mornings will be getting less chilly.
- Some high thin clouds moving overhead overnight did not prevent temperatures from falling very much. With morning frost popping up again north of I-10 and in a few areas south of I-10 to the Intracoastal Waterway. But there's plenty of sunshine ahead for our Tuesday which will help temperatures jump up once again, with highs topping out in the mid 60s. With high pressure moving further to our east, winds are once again out of the east to southeast but should stay relatively light for one more day. A few scattered clouds will be starting to pop up in our skies, but rain chances are basically zero.



- A few clouds will not stop afternoon temperatures from reaching the mid 60's. (KPLC)
- Clouds will continue to increase overnight into Wednesday and more will keep moving over our area through Thursday as well, although rain looks unlikely. Mornings will be a bit more mild and temperatures will be near-normal for this time of year with lows in the 40s and highs in the 60s. A few inland areas could still reach the upper 30s in the morning hours and frost will likely still form in a few areas, so follow our forecast for more on that daily.




- Cloud cover moving back in as the week goes on, but staying generally quiet (KPLC)
- A large upper level trough of low pressure will move from the Rocky Mountains toward the Gulf of Mexico later this week and this will cause an area of low pressure to form over southern Texas by Friday. This low will track east across the Gulf of Mexico over the weekend; and this will bring rain across our area beginning Friday and lingering through Sunday. Rain is not likely to occur the entire time, so if you have outdoor activities planned you may still be able to do them, though it would be best to have an indoor alternative. Of course this will become clearer as we get closer to the weekend.



- Low pressure developing in the region will increase our rain chances this weekend (KPLC)

US National Weather Service Lake Charles Louisiana, Sunday, December 10, 2023

- Chilly temperatures are expected Monday morning with a freeze anticipated away from the immediate coast. While a hard freeze is not forecast, it isn't completely out of the question across isolated sections of Central Louisiana. There is currently a 29% chance that AEX (Alexandria's Airport) falls to 25F or lower.
- Temperatures will gradually warm as the week progresses and rain chances are expected to return by Friday.
